Number of judges required per	Currently the Dressage rule 1.15.9 states that riders may only enter official competition with a horse when they turn 12 years of age. As riders are competing under the age of 12 at Interschool competition, this rule change will exempt those riders who wish to compete in Dressage at Interschool with a horse. Removal of wording relating to Dressage judges as this wording is better suited to sit within rule 8.14 alongside other rules mentioning the use of judges in each event.
Rule 10.2.2	class as per the EA National Dressage Rules.Age of AthletesThe Australian Interschool Championships caters for athletes from primary and secondary schools across the country.Primary competition is restricted to athletes up to 12 years enrolled up to and including year/grade 6 in the year of competition. Those athletes who may be over 12 years of age and still enrolled in Primary School may apply to the NIC for special consideration to be allowed to compete as a Primary school students.The Secondary competition is for those turning 12 enrolled in year 7 to 12 inclusive in the year of	Rule updated as all States are now aligned with Primary aged students starting at Year 6.

	the year of competition. Organising committees may, with the approval of the NIC, include Intermediate divisions in suitable classes. Intermediate is defined as those athletes turning 12 (if in Secondary school) 13, and 14 years old in the current year enrolled in years 7, 8 and 9. Senior divisions are for those athletes turning 15, 16, 17 and 18 years of age enrolled in years 10, 11 and 12 in the current year. Students over 18 years of age, who are members of EA, and who are full time high school students, may apply for special consideration to be allowed to compete.	
Rule 10.5	 Horse Inspections A horse inspection is to be may be scheduled no more than 24 hours prior to the start of competition at Australian Interschool Championships at the discretion of the organising committee. If a full trot-up inspection is not conducted, the organizing committee is still required to confirm the identity of the entered horses and conduct an initial health assessment prior to admission to the venue. The purpose of horse inspections is: To identify Horses To ensure soundness and health of horses To provide a learning opportunity for junior/young athletes. The aim of the Horse Inspection is to ensure the identity and fitness to compete of horses taking part in competitions by providing the same objective protocol for all disciplines. The person responsible (the nominated athlete of the horse at an Australian Interschool Championship) should present the horse for inspection. The horse's identity is checked against its papers (to be provided by the States' chefs d'equipe). The handler stands the horse before walking and trotting away from and toward the inspection panel, as directed by the stewards. Horses are to be presented in a snaffle bridle with ID number Handlers are to be neatly dressed, and wearing enclosed shoes No dye or paint on horses Hooves must not be blackened or coloured in any way Whips are not allowed (unless permission is given by the President of the Ground Jury) 	Rule amended to be an optional requirement for the organising committee at the Australian Interschool Championships in order to ease scheduling and provide an additional day for classes. The organising committee would be responsible for ensuring the identity of horses is completed and horses are picked up by judges, stewards or technical delegates during competition if they have soundness/health issues. Suggested that horse inspections can be done during interschool clinics or other competitions as an educational opportunity for interschool riders.

	the champion, reserve champion and 3rd placed team	
	in each team discipline. Team Points are awarded	
	where an athlete has completed all phases/sections of	
	a class without elimination or disqualification.	
	When calculating a discipline team score, the total	
	individual points of the top three individuals (within	
	each discipline) are counted. The fourth member's	
	points (if there is a 4th member) are used only to	
	determine the outcome in the case of a tie. In Eventing	
	as 5th riders are allowed in classes all riders scores	
	may be considered to count toward the team score.	
	In the event there are multiple team members on the	
	same individual points the riders that have competed	
	at the highest level scores will be counted.	
	Where a rider has competed in more than one	
	championship in a discipline, only the highest	
	championship score is counted eg. If a rider competes	
	in elementary and novice dressage championships	
	then the championship that has accrued the highest	
	points counts.	
	Where a rider competes on more than one horse in a	
	discipline only one of the riders scores may count	
	towards the team score eg a rider cannot be in a team	
	on 2 horses.
